
Is China the boogeyman?

The COVID-19 Blame Game

Doctors, scientists, and disease control experts didn't seem to have a ready answer for COVID. That puts politicians in a difficult position. As such, we should be careful blaming politicians. The Democrats want to blame Donald Trump

The Democrats have been extremely critical of Donald Trump's response. They say he didn't react swiftly and decisively enough and that at times he appeared to play down the impact of the virus. They say this despite the fact that the apolitical CDC clearly struggled to find the right response, despite the fact that most countries, including those most like us in Europe, had similar challenges and responses, despite the fact that Joe Biden criticized one of President Trump's most decisive, early measures, shutting down travel with China, and despite the fact that Democratic Governors played a huge role in the response and there were some notable missteps made on their part, including Governor Cuomo of New York allowing the transfer of patients to retirement facilities.

President Trump wants to blame China

Not to be outdone, President Trump takes that blame and shifts it to China. Presumably the Democrats figure that, since Trump is President, i.e., he was in the chair when it happened, it must be his fault. President Trump's response seems similarly predicated on the idea that, since COVID-19 started in China, it must be their fault. Also similar to the Democrats, President Trump's criticism of China ignores the fact that, since everyone struggled to deal with the virus, isn't it likely that China would make mistakes as well?

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The President criticized China's application of travel restrictions

In his recent UN address, President Trump cited the fact that China delayed closing down travel in and out of China as evidence of its culpability. While this is true, it must be put into perspective. At first, China didn't shut down anything. Then it restricted travel from Wuhan, the epicenter. Then travel was restricted to Hubei Province, where Wuhan is located. Then restrictions were extended further to other parts of China, although much of the country was not locked down as much as Hubei. Then came global travel restrictions.

China's decisions were similar to those of other countries

This is a similar pattern as was experienced in the rest of the world as governments took measured steps—rightfully so because no one wants to shut down a society and an economy—and then increased the measures as the advance of the
